

McLAREN VALE SCHOOL CENTENARY

1876 - 1976

Although schools were established in McLaren Val prior to 1876, for purposes of this article we will work from the year '76 to the present, giving a span of 100 years. On occasion, we have gone further back into records to be able to put many interesting facts before the public, who may or may not have heard of such events.

Not all dates and information appearing are entirely accurate because of imcomplete records and conflicting information from which this article has been compiled.

In 1861 it appears that there were 3 schools at McLaren Vale (we believe that there were 7) around this date, but just when they operated and the actual dates are impossible to verify. It was in the year 1876 that licensed schools (in most cases) were taken over as Public Schools, and the first list of Public Schools shows:

1877 McLaren Vale 78 pupils 1877 McLaren Flat 56 pupils

One of the first schools in McLaren Vale was conducted by Mr. William Gooding and another by Mr. Isaac Prior, who started the original Bellevae School and his cottage still stands behind "The Barn" to the present day. Early records show that Annie Dallison was one of the first teachers and it is also known that her father was the first to teach at the Tsong Gyiaou School which was later taken over by his daughter Annie. This school was demolished in 1928.

In those early days of schooling, it was necessary for teachers to report to the Board regarding attendances. Each member of the Board undertook to do all in their power to induce parents to send their children regularly to school. A minute from a meeting held on Feb. 18th, 1885 states that Miss Annie Dallison (teacher) granted a school holiday on March 27th on account of the Willunga Show. In 1862 it is learnt that Miss Ellen Chappelle opened a school for girls and boys.

About this time, free education was granted upon application to the Board, under special circumstances for children of widows, deserted wives etc. The Board covered a wide area: from the top of Willunga Hill, then known as Browns Flat (now Dingabledinga) to Reynella.

Records of a meeting held on June 27th, it 1885 show an account passed for payment to J. Morgan for £2/4/0 for work done at the school. Teacher, Miss Annie Dallison applied to the Board on March 20th, 1886, for repairs to the school and their reply was No funds available". (not much has changed since then). An inspection was made at the school on May 21st, 1887 with the view of flagging the floors of the shelter shed. Later a bill was received from Mr. John Allen for supplying, carting and laying complete 350 feet of sawn "flagging". Total cost £13/10/0. "Flagging" was a method of paving a floor with split stone.

Tsong Gyla by his dau demolished It was reported in the late 1800's that in large schools the teacher was seriously over-worked and exhausted during part of the day in the vain attempt to control and lead the minds of a large class and during the remaining portion he not only has no full employment, but is really assisting the children when they should be learningto work alone. About this time Inspector Neale reports that he fears the importance of pure air is not sufficiently realized by most teachers. He also states that he finds himslef almost engaged in a crusade against the closing of doors and windows. Much of the bad health of teachers and the weariness and listlessness of children may be traced to working in poluted air. Also about this time, the Inspector reports that the general efficiency of the schools were well maintained within the limits laid down. What is needed is more time to watch the teacher at work and then to talk over the points we have noted.

About this time, absenteeism was dealt with in detail. Parents of children who were absent without lawful excuses for long periods, were summoned and on oecasions a school was closed so that the teacher would attend the Willunga Court when the case was heard.

In January 1888 a bill was received from S. Dunstone for plastering & whitewashing & cleaning of the school. £1/15/0. Also at this time a request was put forward for repairs to guttering and a window requiring putty and paint. Ventilation pipe out of office damaged in the joint. To be done.

In November 1891 a Treasury order was received for £2/8/5 for erecting a verandah at the school, and asking that the account may be certified. The Department to be informed that they have had no intimation whatever in reference to the verandah which in their opinion was not required. Therefore they cannot certify as to its correctness.

On October 6th, 1892 an application was received from Mr. J. G. Kelly asking for permission to use a school room for the purpose of holding a Public meeting on October 17th next. - grantad.

During the same month, the Willunga Board of Advice inspected the school. Attendance was very satisfactory. After seeing the children put through their usual exercises, the Board inspected the School buildings and were pleased to find that there was ample room.

A school holiday was granted for the occasion of Mr. Hardy's vintage picnic during the month of May 1893. Also in the month of May a bill was received for an oven for the school for £2/12/6. This was certified correct and sent on to the Department.

In July 1895, Mr. Davie (Headmaster) stated that his family were put to inconvenience through not having a private water closet. A letter was received from the Inspector stating that it is not the practice of the Department, in small schools to erect

separate outbuildings for the teachers private use. Reply forwarded to Mr. Dave On Oct. 16th, 1896 Mr. Davie applied for a holiday on 5th Nov. for the children to attend the Congregational Sunday School picnic in Waverly Park .. Approved.

In June 1896, the Board were of the opinion that grape picking should be allowed to enable children of poor parents to earn a little money for clothing. In May 1898, a notice was received from the Dept. stating that Jarrah floors had been laid in McLaren Vale School. In December 1899 the Headmaster applied for a half day holiday on 21st Dec. for a children's Tea on the occasion of breaking up... granted. At this time, Mr. Skitch (H/M) also applied to have the school enlarged as the numbers attending school was increasing and the schoolroom was altogether too small for the number attending. Dept. replied informing Mr. Skitch to obtain a requisition from the parents & residents then it should be presented to the authorities with an urgent request that it be attended to at once. In Feb. 1900 the Dept. decided that some additions must be made to the school & until such time, they have taken the Congregational School Room at 10/0 per week.

The Inspectors report for 1901 shows that very little had been done to improve defective lighting of many of the old Buildings. Injury to eyesight will continue unless rooms are flooded with light.

It was stated in the Inspector's report for 1907 that if inspections were conducted along proper lines, they were far more important than examations. Altho! reading is the most difficult and most important to teach, there are many teachers who think they can give a reading lesson without any preparation. A great drawback to efficient and successful work in some schools is the needless irregularity of many pupils. Most teachers give some attention to the ventilation of the school, but there are still a few who fail to recognize its importance. Inspector Neal states that "During my boyhood, and for some years afterwards, the reputation of a school was often made upon the writing of its pupils." If such were the case nowadays, I am afraid a few of our public schools sould "go down."

As a general rule, according to the Inspector's report for 1909, the behaviour of the children is good. Mild epidemics of measles and whooping cough with scattered cases of other infectious diseases have affected attendance. The use of the common towel and drinking cup is still a source of danger. Increased attention has been given to school hygiene, the importance of which demands almost the constant attention of the teacher, both in the school and on the playground.

It is noted in the Reports for the year 1911, the inspector commented that it was his wish that every school in South Australia, that a social function of some type be held once a year to raise funds for school needs and also to bring teachers, children and parents into closer personal relationships.

Schools made surprising progress in 1912. despite being affected greatly by epidemics of various diseases. Some teachers have resorted to "cram" methods. Teachers who stoop to this kind of work, belie their training and act most unjustly towards their pupils. Their conduct deserves severe condemnation. The problem of mentally retarded children is drawn to our attention in the medical Inspector's report. He states there is a need for some provision to be made as the matter is constantly before us. In one school it was noted that the stockings of all children were without holes. Spelling is undoubtedly a difficult subject to teach, but it is improving and better than it appears on paper as in some cases, tests were somewhat more difficult. It was reported in 1914 that writing was below the standard of that of 20 years ago. This may be attributed to the peculiar manner in which the chalk is held in early stages and improper use of small blackboards.

The following comments come from Inspectors Reports and School Journals over the dates mentioned. On July 28th, 1925 it is noted that of 98 students enrolled, 76 were present. "Needlework" specimens are from very good to excellent. The yard is large and well drained but there are objectionable and unsightly buildings fully exposed. The garden is exceedin j good: it is creditable to Mr. Shapter and the boys.

Dates relating to the following comments are not of significance but the notations are quite interesting. The QC results were not satisfactory.. The children appear today to me able to concentrate better than before. Children are being trained to be more careful and ambitious.. Many are not yet enterprising enough.. Two drums have recently been purchased. A strong band of 30 performers are giving brightness to the marching.. It is a happy, neat school in which cheerful effort and industry result from good teaching and humane treatment.. Interests include an efficient band and a branch of the Penny Bank.. The buildings are a little shabby in appearance but structure is essentially spund.. New wooden room recently opened by Director of Education (still to be equipped)

School reopened on January 27th, 1942 after the Christmas vacation with an enrollment higher than the previous year. Stock and equipment had been received from the Seaview School. Later in the year, air raid trenches were dug by parents and friends. On June 17th, 1944 the school was the centre of great activity. Messrs Ralph & Ed Hunt and Mr. Harry Radford gave gratis service & constructed a sandpit 12 feet in diameter for the infants. Two hundred bricks were donated by Penfolds and several bags of cement from the Fruit Packers. In the afternoon, A busy Bee was held to fill in the old Air Raid trenches in Mr. Ellis's paddock. (Where now stand the McLaren Vale Transport sheds) The masons completed the sandpit & repaired the cricket pitch.

An Army hut had been procured in 1947 and was to be erected at an early date. On April 29th, 1950, Mr. McEwen (Minister of Health) laid the foundation stone to Southern Districts War Memor-fal Hospital.

was awarded a special prize of £1. Mid term in the year 1950, it is noted that school buildings consisted of two stone classrooms, built many years ago and also a 40' X 18' Army hut. There was also a small woodwork room. The yard had been recently terraced and top dressed to form a fine all weather assembly area. Gardens were established. In March 1952 a portable classroom was erected.

In the year 1955, it is noted that there were 150 pupils in attendance and the school was still growing. It was felt that the playing space was too limited. With the exception of one portable room, the whole school building is antiquated. In such a thriving, prosperous and stable town - a new school is warranted - overdue.

Transfer from the old site to the new location (present school) was carried out over the May vacation in 1961 and the school functioned in the splendid new building from the first day of the second term. Early in 1962, the long range development plans for the grounds were already initiated with 78 trees. 6 shrubs and 20 roses already established and 500 feet of water piping laid. A - practice cricket pitch, 2 basketball courts and a sandpit have also been provided. It is noted in May 1963 that there was now an enroll-- ment of approximately 163. At this time the Inspector reported "McLaren Vale School is the best in my District. The Head Teacher & his staff are doing outstanding work and I congratulate them on their efforts".

Further reports state, the splendid school eval d gardens are a credit to the school and the Dept. ere is a vitality and freshness in this School ich ranks as one of the best in my District. E School is an integral part of the community d it is fulfilling its important role in an icellent manner. The school and its environs are delight to behold and reflect great credit on all o are responsible for the supervision and up-keep.

18th June 1965 OFFICIAL OPENING DAY (Present school)

1pm - All children responsible for the convenience of guests were in place.
Mr. McLay (Inspector) and Mr. Mander Jones (Director of Education) arrived early.

2:05pm - The Minister, the Hon. R. R. Loveday arrived and was greeted by the Director who introduced the Chairman and wife; President and husband and Head Teacher and wife. After passing through the Guard of Honour (Gds 1 - 3) and meeting guests assembled in the foyer, the Minister's party inspected the school.

2:30pm - All were ready on the dias and the Physical Education display by all students commenced.

Ogramme - National Anthem, Address by Minister unveiling plaque, Vote of Appreciation, Song of Australia.

Party then to afternoon tea and the Minister departed at 4:10pm.

... Truly a most successful function ...

On October 18th, 1965 a "Gala Day" was held at the School and nett proceeds were £103/3/6d. A most successful function and stalls reported brisk trade. The Headmaster reports on Oct. . 5th, 1967 that weather conditions etc, are causing loss of school time through sickness. Nasty coughs (close to whooping cough) nose . bleeding and sudden bilious attacks are common. Fifty percent of Grade 2 absent today. Lunchtime entertainment came the way of the students in October 1967 when a Coca-Cola rep. called with the world champ "Yo-Yo" expert with him. The children sat on the lawn and enjoyed an excellent display given by the "champ." In April 1968, the Headteacher reports the following staff problem: "We can't carry on as we are now staffed - 4 teachers (2 new from college) for 152 pupils and no infant trained teacher.

As a mark of respect to the late Mr. R. McCormick (previous H/T) a special assembly was held on June 21st 1968 and the flag was lowered. Mr. McCormick had given 9 years service to the children of this district.

It is reported that the School was broken into on the night of July 15th 1968, A window in the boys toilet was forced. All rooms had been enteredand cupboards and drawers left open. The office was the main sufferer. The culprits were evidently after cash as the tape recorder was not touched while the School fund cash how was taken. Five other schools in the area were burgled on the same night and the gang responsible were duly apprehended.

School reopened after the May vacation in 1970 with 12 new pupils from the Blewitt Springs School which had been closed.

Of the schools which existed over the years in this area, it is known that three of the school buildings (then) are still in daily use to this day. One of these being the RSL Hall in Aldersley St., another the Nurses Residence at the rear of the SDWM Hospital (which was burnt out in 1899) and the last the cottage immediately behind the Barn, which is presently hired out for parties, receptions etc. through the Barn.

The year 1976 shows yet another addition to "Our School" in an additional two classrooms coming onto the grounds. The school supports an attendance of 164 students to this day.

It has given us much pleasure in the preparation of this information, and it is sincerely hoped that others will find it interesting on the occasion of our Centenary and for many years to come.
